


AVOIDING THE BIGHT

For today's longshore worker, it is more vital then ever to "Avoid the Bight", when working around Container Handling Equipment.



Be aware, chassis have a natural "bight". There have been several fatalities & serious injuries when workers have been caught in the bight by the tires & the chassis, or in blind spots of cargo handling equipment (blue shaded areas).

Avoiding the bight comes down to this.... being aware of your surroundings while your on the job, and always having a planned way of escape if you need one.





Whether you're working around Semi Tractors, Top Picks or any cargo handling equipment, make sure the operator knows where you are, make sure you know where they are, and always "Avoid the Bight"
